Care Closer to Home

> Municipal long term care homes are part of the fabric of local communities

- > They ensure seniors can receive services in the community and are able to stay close to family and friends
- > Municipal services are provided in the community, for the community, by the community



Care for Everyone



- >Municipal homes are part of the local fabric
- > Well-informed about the local population, and strive to meet specific cultural and local needs
- > Programs are tailored to local ethnic, linguistic, and generational preferences
- > Municipal homes Open doors and have the resources to meet the needs of vulnerable populations



High Quality Care

Being part of a broader organization means that municipal homes have the additional resources to provide:

- > Higher levels of staffing
- > Optimal staff-skill mix
- > More programming and supports
- > Community programs for seniors

High Quality Care

- > Rigorous systematic reviews have shown that not-for-profit homes excel on a range of quality measures:
 - More hours of care
 - Higher staff-skill mix
 - Lower mortality rates
 - Lower staff turnover
 - Lower restraint use
 - Lower hospital admissions
- >Our data has also shown that NFP homes are often the provider of choice



Innovative and Integrated Care

- >The *Patients First Act, 2017*, puts renewed emphasis on service integration
- > Municipalities are models of integration and collaboration
- > Many municipalities are beginning to offer a **continuum** of integrated services to seniors



Innovative and Integrated Care

- > These **continuums** include:
 - Range of seniors' housing options
 - Community services
 - Wellness programs and Seniors' Active Living Centres
- > Municipalities are building **age-friendly communities** to support seniors aging in place



Strong, Caring Communities

- > Municipal homes help build strong, caring communities
- > Many community volunteers:
 - Engaged in providing care and companionship to seniors
 - Gives volunteers (many seniors) sense of purpose
 - Intergenerational programs (youth and seniors)

In 2014, municipal homes were supported by **903,550 volunteer hours** which is equal to **463 full-time jobs**

A Strong Voice for Seniors

- > Leaders from municipalities and municipal homes are invited to contribute at provincial tables
- > Municipal representatives advocate strongly on behalf of their constituents to ensure that they receive the best services
- > Advocacy efforts are expected to result in benefits for seniors and their families

- > Municipal homes make a significant contribution to their local economies
- > Many resident families and employees live, work and play locally
- > Municipal homes are often the most significant community employer




Good Jobs and Economic Benefits

Meeting the Needs of Future Seniors



Infographic: Statistics Canada

- > For the first time, the 2016 Canadian Census revealed that the proportion of seniors *surpassed* the proportion of children under 15 years
- >Tomorrow's seniors are expected to live longer, be more diverse, and likely need long term care at older ages



Meeting the Needs of Future Seniors

- >Municipal LTCHs Well positioned to assess and meet the changing needs of seniors and their communities
- > As such, municipal homes will continue to be able to provide essential contributions toward helping older adults age gracefully



Current Context: Aging with Confidence

- > **Aging with Confidence: Action Plan for Seniors** released in November 2017
- > Key Commitments
 - > More age-friendly communities
 - > More Seniors' Active Living Centres and Community Engagement
 - > More Naturally Occurring Retirement Communities
 - > Expansion of Supportive Housing
 - > More Home Care Hours and increased caregiver support
 - > More dementia support
 - > Redevelopment of 30,000 existing LTC beds
 - > Creation of 5,00 new LTC beds by 2022 and 30,000 new beds over the next decade
 - > Additional 15 million hours of nursing, PSW, and therapeutic care in LTC
 - > Palliative and end-of-life care for more than 2,000 additional people

- > Overall funding adequacy
- > Funding level of care requirements
- >System capacity
- >Innovation
