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Why is significant planned expansion vital?

- Ontario's space target of 86,000+ spaces won't be met by the old "popcorn method" of expansion.
- In Ontario 53% of younger children live in child care deserts.

 But focus on "space creation" or "expansion" alone is the wrong frame. We need to think about system building with the goal of a stable, inclusive, quality system.



Current state

Provinces and territories now have capital programs of some kind, by like Ontario's Start-Up Grants (approx \$7000 per space), some don't cover the full cost of expansion.

- NL: Child Care Capacity Initiative, \$8000 per new space
- PEI: Low-interest loans, expansion grants
- NS: Space Expansion grant 100% of costs for successful
- applicants
- MB: building fund (60%), Ready to Move
- SK: Space Creation Grant (\$13,360 per space)
- BC: Major and minor capital programs

Most are still application based. We have moved from "popcorn method" to "directed growth" but not yet to truly planned growth. Full PT comparative chart.

Lessons from Norway's barnhager

- ELCC has become a legal right in Norway Today more than 90% of children 1-5 years attend full-time.
- Period of rapid expansion between 2003-2009, at the end of which ELCC became a legal entitlement.

Lessons from Norway's barnhager

- Key was a *national goal* of universal access, **municipal planning** with significant earmarked grants to support expansion.
- Municipalities could and did expand both municipal programs and non-profit programs.
- A champion for ELCC within the national government, who achieved multiparty support for full provision and ensured support for allocation of necessary resources to achieve it.



How is this similar or different from what we have in Canada now with \$10aDay? How can we move closer to this?

Who collaborated on Norway's rapid expansion?

- National government, the Norwegian State Housing Bank, Norwegian Association of Local and Regional Authorities, Private Kindergarten Association (employer association representing non-profit barnehager).
- For-profit expansion in the early 2010's was met by deprivatization efforts, bringing more barnhager back to municipal operation. Governments strengthened regulations to prevent excessive profit-making.

 More than "space creation" - an overall plan for system-building with articulated values. Lessons from Manitoba's Ready to Move (RTM)

- Collaboration between governments of Canada and Manitoba, First Nations governments, local municipalities, JQ Built (a non-profit Municipal Participation Corporation), non-profit child care operators.
- Modular construction, with standardized designs. RTMs are intended to quickly increase supply in a short period of time, and especially support expansion in small, rural and remote communities.

Lessons from Manitoba's RTM

- Capital costs are funded through theCanada-Manitoba CWELCC Agreement.
- Municipalities apply for funding and must provide approximately two acres of serviced land.
- Municipality provides the space rent-free to a non-profit child care operator for a minimum of 15 years.
- In Manitoba, municipalities have no formal role in child care and historically have had little involvement in planning for, funding or delivering child care. They participated not because they have a mandate but because they know it is important to their communities.



Overall lessons

- Publicly led and planned expansion with goal of a *stable system*. **Move from directed growth to planned growth.**
- Using public buildings and public land to expand child care services.
- **Real collaboration** between levels of government and non-profit agencies.
- Needs a champion, not necessarily a mandate first.
- None of us may feel that we have the "ear of government" but together local governments and the child care community can be heard.
